2 Fly-overs of the International Space Station

During evening twilight on the nights of **Mar. 20th & 22nd**, look for a bright flyover of the ISS in our region. The ISS should be easily spotted by most observers during dusk, and it should continue to be visible for several minutes. Watch it as it rises in the W-SW skies, crosses overhead at 17,500 mph, and then disappears into the Earth's shadow before reaching the E-NE horizon.

For folks with a clear open sky to the horizons, these ISS passages should be visible for 2 to 4 minutes.
